# IMMA Exhibition Programme: Two Separate Locations

Since 31 May 2012 the Irish Museum of Modern Art's exhibitions programme is based in two separate locations - the New Galleries in the grounds of the Royal Hospital in Kilmainham and the ground floor exhibition spaces in the National Concert Hall building in Earlsfort Terrace. IMMA is also presenting its full range of tours and lectures and its children's, young people's, adult and education programmes in both locations.

The move to the NCH building is due to extensive refurbishment works being carried out at the main building at the RHK throughout 2012. The new location provides IMMA with an ideal city centre space, which won warm praise during the *Dublin Contemporary* exhibition in 2011.

The Museum is very grateful to the Minister for Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, Jimmy Deenihan, TD, and to the officials in his Department for making the spaces available to IMMA, to the OPW, who are responsible for the building, for all their help, and to the Chairman, Board, Chief Executive and staff of the National Concert Hall for their generous cooperation.

In addition to the exhibitions in the New Galleries, and education and community programmes, the grounds of the RHK remain open to the public with four different art trails available to visitors. The café and bookshop also remain open throughout this period. Due to the refurbishment works the Artists' Residency Programme is operating on a limited basis, but will resume fully following the reopening of the main Museum building.

IMMA's National Programme continues as normal with exhibitions and projects in Clifden, Co Galway, Roscommon Town, Co Roscommon and Athlone, Co Westmeath.

# Neil Jordan, *Not I*, 2000, an adaptation for film of the play *Not I*, 1972 by Samuel Beckett

This unique film-based installation, *Not I,* directed by Neil Jordan and featuring the American actress Julianne Moore is presented in the Annex space at IMMA's NCH site. As part of the ongoing IMMA Collection exhibition *Time out of Mind*, a film installation by Clodagh Emoe, *Parodos*, 2009, is presented in the entrance space of the Annex.

Based on Samuel Beckett's play *Not I*, 1972, the film installation presents an actress seated on a stage with just her mouth visible. The mouth then delivers a long monologue, a constant stream of consciousness. Jordan filmed his interpretation, which is 13 minutes in duration, from multiple angles in long, complete, 13-minute takes, since the piece only reveals itself through the pressure and physical demands of the uninterrupted performance of the text. Realising that each take had its own integrity Jordan developed his original film version into a multi-screen installation in which Moore's mouth appears on six screens arranged in a circular configuration. For this installation while the artwork maintains its essentially circular configuration, the scale of the Annex, enables the use of especially large screens to create an enhanced, spatially immersive experience.

*Not I* is part of a unique and ambitious project, *Beckett on Film*, the brain-child of Michael Colgan, Director of the Gate Theatre, in which each of Beckett's 19 plays were committed to film in 2000-2001. Each had a different director, charged with adapting the demands of Beckett's plays to film while adhering to his exacting stage directions. *Not I* was adapted for film by Neil Jordan as part of the project and donated to IMMA in 2001.

# Alice Maher Becoming

Becoming is a mid-career retrospective of the work of Alice Maher, one of Ireland's most respected and influential artists. The title hints at some of the artist's main preoccupations and the themes that the exhibition explores. Her work is in a continual state of 'becoming', as her practice has evolved over the last 25 years. Nothing is constant in her world - things are always in flux or at a moment of metamorphosis. Material transformation underpins her process as the artist has employed multiple media including painting, drawing, sculpture, installation, photography, video and digital technologies, to explore themes and subjects.

Becoming indicates a point of transformation, and the philosophical arena in which Maher places her work. Readings of Ovid and Deleuze, and the concept of an ever changing universe, underpin Maher's oeuvre. That which is acceptable or 'becoming' is constantly called into question, and everything seems to turn into its opposite in alarming or uncanny ways. Through constant change, reworking and examination, Maher uncovers ever more complex readings of the world around and within us.

The exhibition incorporates older works alongside previously unseen and newly-commissioned pieces in a dynamic way, positing a future for the artist's practice while at the same time placing her in a historic context. *Cassandra's Necklace*, 2012, a major new film work commissioned by IMMA, and inspired by a script sent to the artist by writer Anne Enright, premieres at the exhibition.





A new site-specific installation, *L'Université*, 2012, which addresses the history of Earlsfort Terrace as a place of learning has been created, and *Cell*, Maher's iconic ball of thorns first shown in Kilmainham Jail in 1991, has been re-staged.



# NEW FAITH LOVE SONG

*NEW FAITH LOVE SONG* by Garrett Phelan comprises an ambitious off-site live performance sound work and an exhibition of sound, photography, drawing, sculpture and animation in the New Galleries at IMMA.

The live performance sound work involved the bell-ringers of both Christ Church Cathedral and St Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin city centre on 21 June. Phelan worked with the bells of the two cathedrals to create a live conversation between these two iconic monuments. The bellringing dialogue acted as a declaration pronouncing the arrival of 'New Faith'. This proclamation of 'New Faith' is inspired by a loss of faith and the consequential intermediary period of faithlessness, leading to the reconstruction and manifestation of 'New Faith'. This new work symbolises the realisation of 'New Faith' and culminates in a 'bell-ringing' celebration that evokes the optimism that can stem from the inexplicable.

Born in 1965 in Dublin, Garrett Phelan has developed a distinctive art practice that directly engages the audience with ambitious site-specific drawing projects, FM radio broadcasts, sculptural installations, photography and animation. He has exhibited widely in Ireland and internationally, including the 11th Lyon Biennial, France; 4th Auckland Triennial, New Zealand; SMART Project Space, Amsterdam; ICA, London; The Fruitmarket Gallery, Edinburgh; Kunstverein, Hannover; Art Statements, Basel 39; Manifesta 5; San Sebastian and previously at IMMA.

The exhibition was commissioned by former Director Enrique Juncosa, and is co-curated by him and Rachael Thomas, Senior Curator: Head of Exhibitions, IMMA.

# Sidney Nolan, Ned Kelly Series presented by Etihad Airways

This exhibition presents the famous *Ned Kelly* series of paintings by the celebrated Australian artist Sidney Nolan. Painted in 1946 and 1947, the series takes the form of stylised depictions of the exploits of the notorious bushranger Ned Kelly in the Australian outback. The works were originally held at Heide Museum of Modern Art, Melbourne, where Nolan had painted 26 of the 27 when it was the home of his close friends John and Sunday Reed. They were gifted to the National Gallery of Australia in 1977.

The *Ned Kelly* series follows the main sequence of the Kelly story. However, Nolan did not intend the series to be an authentic portrayal of events. Rather, the various episodes became the setting for the artist's meditations upon universal themes of injustice, love and betrayal. The Kelly saga was also a way for Nolan to paint the Australian landscape in new ways, with the story giving meaning to the place.

Born in 1917 in Melbourne, Sidney Nolan attended the National Gallery of Victoria School of Art. He was conscripted into the army in 1942 and began to paint his immediate surroundings the Australian outback. In 1945 he began his first paintings on the theme of Ned Kelly. From 1953, Nolan began travelling extensively from his base in London, he painted many remarkable series of works inspired by his travels to Europe, Africa, China and Antarctica. Nolan made several visits to Ireland, where he painted his *Wild Geese* series, inspired by the many Irish soldiers who fled the country after the failed Jacobite War of the 1690s, representing them as wellknown latter day exiles and wanderers such as James Joyce and Ernest Shackleton. Six of the series were donated to the IMMA Collection on the foundation of the Museum in 1991, and are included in this exhibition.

Major retrospective exhibitions of Sidney Nolan's work include the Whitechapel Art Gallery, London, 1957; National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne, travelling to Sydney, Perth and Adelaide, 1987; and more recently at the Art Gallery of New South Wales, Sydney, 2007. Nolan's work is widely represented by the National Gallery of Australia; The Tate, London; The Museum of Modern Art, New York; the Pittsburgh Museum of Art, and the Irish Museum of Modern Art. Sidney Nolan was knighted in 1981 and was awarded the Order of Merit in 1983. He died in London in 1992.

# What is the Artists' Residency Programme?

The Artists' Residency Programme (ARP) is the Irish Museum of Modern Art's studio / residency programme. The ARP provides opportunities for artists, curators, critical writers and art professionals to research and develop their practices. It supports both emerging and established professionals, working in any medium, by application or invitation, and is open to Irish and international applicants.

For the duration of 2012 the Artists' Residency Programme will focus on developing its resources for 2013 onwards. Due to the refurbishment at IMMA's RHK site ARP activities will be limited however the full provision of facilitating art professionals living and working on-site at IMMA will recommence following the partial closure.

## **ARP Selection in Progress**

The Artists' Residency Programme online application deadline for 2012 has now passed. The selection process is currently underway and successful applications will be scheduled to participate on the Residency Programme in 2013 when it resumes fully at IMMA. IMMA will announce its ARP participants for 2013 later in 2012.

# 30 August – 30 October | All at Sea

#### St Patricks' University Hospital, Dublin

The Art Gallery at St Patrick's University Hospital was opened in February 2011 having been developed over the previous two years by the members of the Art Committee at SPUH. The purpose in developing the gallery was to facilitate the appreciation of visual art by the SPUH community, its staff, service users and visitors. *All at Sea* demonstrates the SPUH's commitment to hosted exhibitions from leading Irish artists and galleries and includes work by John Bellany, Barrie Cooke, William Crozier, Stephen McKenna and Michael Mulcahy.

# 20 – 30 September | Captivating Brightness

#### Off-site, Clifden, Co Galway

*Captivating Brightness* was curated to celebrate the 35th anniversary of Clifden Arts Week, a festival of national and international significance. The title *Captivating Brightness*, taken from the poem *Ballynahinch Lake* by Seamus Heaney, recognises the strong multi-disciplinary approach of the festival. The exhibition brings together work that enters the heart of the West through an exploration of major Irish and international artists all of whom have either responded directly to or have strong links with Connemara. Presenting a selection of historical works by artists such as Jack B. Yeats and Paul Henry alongside contemporary artists such as Richard Long and Dorothy Cross further highlight the enduring ability of the West of Ireland to excite and captivate the imagination of the artist.

## 16 November – 14 December | Fabric of Identity

#### Roscommon Arts Centre, Co Roscommon

Dress is an instant and effective display of identity and an important component of our daily lives. Through clothing, individuals establish their sense of self as well as their place in society. Including works such as *The Troubles: an Artist's Document of Ulster* by Les Levine, *Fabric of Identity* explores the presentation of individual and collective identities, private and public personas.

## 30 November – 25 March | Reflections

#### Athlone Art Gallery, Co Westmeath

Athlone Contemporary Art Gallery is an exciting new purpose built contemporary gallery on the banks of the Shannon. Brave architectural design incorporates the former Town Hall and Library building, the building has three diverse gallery spaces with an emphasis on the engagement of a local and national audience. Through a varied series of exhibitions and the development of an extensive education and community programme, the gallery will strive for excellence within a national and international setting. *Reflections* comprises work by artists such as Shane Cullen, Patrick Graham and Marcel Duchamp. The exhibition focuses on work which allows the individual to reflect, not only on their own history and memories, but that of others.

#### How to get to IMMA

Museum Entrance on Military Road. Exhibitions are on show in the New Galleries.

- By Luas: Red Line to Heuston Station (5 minutes walk via Military Rd).
- By bus: Buses to Heuston Station (5 minutes walk via Military Rd): 26 from Pearse St; 51, 79 from Aston Quay; 90 Dart Feeder Bus from Connolly and Tara Street Stations to Heuston Station, 145 to Heuston Station from Bray.

Buses to James St (5 minutes walk via steps to Bow Lane onto Irwin St and Military Rd): 123 from O'Connell St/Dame St; 51B, 78A from Aston Quay.

By car: 10 minute drive from city centre.

#### **New Parking Arrangements**


Due to an increasing problem with non-Museum visitors leaving vehicles in the IMMA car park for lengthy periods, the Museum has put in place a carefully-structured payment system, which is being operated by Park Rite. This is designed to deter long-term parking while at the same time facilitating IMMA visitors with an initial charge of just €1 for the first three hours. The new arrangement will be monitored carefully in order to identify and deal with any unforeseen problems.

- On foot: Approx. 30 to 40 minutes from city centre.
- By train: 5 minute walk from Heuston Station; from Connolly and Tara Street Stations by 90 bus or Red Line Luas from Connolly Station to Heuston Station.



#### How to get to IMMA @ NCH at Earlsfort Terrace

- By Luas: Green Line to Harcourt Street (5 minutes walk via St. Stephen's Green).
- By bus: Buses to Earlsfort Terrace: 14, 15, 15a, 15b, 44, 140.
- By car: Earlsfort Terrace is in the city centre beside St. Stephen's Green. Pay and display parking in nearby streets. Private car parks in the area include: The Royal College of Surgeons Car Park, Dawson Street Car Park, Schoolhouse Lane Car Park, St. Stephen's Green Car Park, Setanta Place Car Park.
- By train: 8 minute walk from Pearse Street Station.
- By bike: There are Dublin Bikes stations on Earlsfort Terrace and St. Stephen's Green.
