Barrie Cooke

Organised to mark Barrie Cooke's 80th birthday, this exhibition is a wide-ranging survey of Cooke's work comprising some 70 paintings and sculptures, from the Sheila-Na-Gig series and the Perspex bone boxes of the 1960s and 1970s to the nudes which have formed a constant mode of expression in his practice. Works are drawn from the Museum's own significant holding of Cooke's work, as well as from public and private collections.

A major figure in the development of painting in Ireland, Barrie Cooke was born in England, but since 1954 has been resident in Ireland, which he found offered him an ideal environment for his lifelong love of nature.

Out of the Dark Room works from The David Kronn Collection

This exhibition is drawn from a collection of more than 450 photographs brought together by the Irish-born American collector David Kronn. The collection ranges in content from 19th-century Daguerreotypes to the 20th-century photography of Edward Weston and August Sander and works from award-winning contemporary photographers, such as the husband and wife team of Nicolai Howalt and Trine Sondergaard, and the Japanese photographer Asako Narahashi. It is particularly strong in its representation of Harry Callahan, Kenneth Josephson, Irving Penn and Brett Weston.

Out of the Dark Room presents a selection of 165 works across all photographic media. There are numerous iconic works, examples being Herb Ritts's image of pop star Madonna from 1986; the portrait of Laurie Anderson by Robert Mapplethorpe from 1987; or Dr Harold Edgerton's time-lapse photograph of a boy running from 1939. Dr Kronn is a paediatrician with a specialisation in medical genetics, a fact which underlies the many images of children in the collection – Diane Arbus's *Loser at a Diaper Derby*, 1967, for instance; or Martine Franck's images of children from Tory Island (1994-97), and Irina Davis's poignant portraits of children in a Russian state orphanage (2006-2007).

David Kronn has promised to gift his collection to IMMA. He has begun this process by donating a portrait of the celebrated Frenchborn artist Louise Bourgeois by Annie Leibovitz to the American Friends of the Arts in Ireland who have loaned this work to IMMA until 2014 whereupon it will become a permanent donation.

For Tomorrow For Tonight is the first Irish exhibition by the internationally acclaimed Thai artist and film-maker Apichatpong Weerasethakul. It features new work that explores the theme of night through video, photographs and installation. Night and darkness are recurring motifs in Weerasethakul's films (such as *Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives, Tropical Malady* and *The Primitive Project*). The exhibition comprises three linked films *Goodnight Jenjira – Bathroom; Goodnight Jenjira – Living Room, For Tonight* and the sound work *For Tomorrow*. This new multimedia installation was made following *The Primitive Project*, which was shown to critical acclaim around the world, and his feature film *Uncle Boonmee*.

Weerasethakul belongs to a new generation of Thai artists and film-makers who are now very visible on the international arts scene. Born in Bangkok in 1970, Weerasethakul holds a degree in architecture from Khon Kaen University and a Master of Fine Arts in Film-Making from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. He began making film and video shorts in 1994, and completed his first feature, *Mysterious Object at Noon*, in 2000.

His films have been awarded many prizes, including the Cannes Film Festival Palme d'Or in 2010 for *Uncle Boonmee* and the Jury Prize at the 2004 Cannes Film Festival for *Tropical Malady*.

THROUGH THE EYES: GERARD BYRNE

THROUGH THE EYES comprises of a series of five projects dating from 2003 to 2011 by celebrated Irish artist Gerard Byrne, surveying almost a decade in which his work has been widely recognised internationally. Byrne's multi-layered approach to his work creates an exhibition that is both complex in its subject matter and recognisable in its imaginary reconstructions of the ongoing debates between the present, soon to be past, and the projected future. Influenced by literature and theatre, Byrne's work consistently references a range of sources, from popular magazines of the recent past to iconic Modernist playwrights such as Brecht, Beckett, and Sartre.

The works included in the exhibition are *New Sexual Lifestyles*, 2003, part of the IMMA Collection, and based on a conversation published in the September 1973 issue of *Playboy* magazine; *Subject*, 2009, commissioned by the Henry Moore Institute in Leeds as part of the exhibition *The New Monumentality*, and shot on the campus of Leeds University; *A thing is a hole in a thing it is not*, 2010, a direct response to art critic Michael Fried's seminal text *Art* and *Objecthood*, 1967; 1984 and beyond, 2007 and his ongoing project since 2001 Case Study: Loch Ness.

Liam Gillick: A Game of War Structure, 2011

British artist Liam Gillick presents a site-specific work, commissioned for IMMA, in the form of a newly-designed version of *The Game of War (Le Jeu de la Guerre)*. In 1977, the French Situationist Guy Debord founded the company *Strategic and Historical Games*, with the goal of producing the *Kriegspiel*, a 'game of war'. Inspired by military theory and the European campaigns of Napoleon, Debord's game is a chess-variant played by two opposing players on a game board of 500 squares arranged in rows of 20 by 25 squares (www.r-s-g.org/kriegspiel). The game is located in the public areas of IMMA adjacent to the courtyard. An instruction booklet and the game pieces may be borrowed from the Museum. In addition, specialist gamers will be invited to play during the course of the installation.

Born in London and now based in New York, Liam Gillick is one of the most prominent artists in the field of conceptual art. His work is not limited to a single artistic medium, having also produced an extensive body of critical writing, essays, reviews, fictional texts and more recently theatrical scenarios. Solo exhibitions include Whitechapel Gallery, London, 2002, Palais de Tokyo, 2005 and the MCA, Chicago, 2008-2010. He was nominated for the Turner Prize in 2002 and the Vincent Award at the Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam in 2008. In 2006 he was a central figure in the free art school project unitednationsplaza in Berlin that travelled to Mexico City and New York.

Gillick has published a number of texts that function in parallel to his artwork. He was selected to represent Germany in the 53rd Venice Biennale in 2009. A major exhibition of his work opened at the Kunst und Ausstellungshalle der Bundesrepublik Deutschland in 2010. He has taught at Columbia University in New York since 1997 and the Centre for Curatorial Studies at Bard College since 2008.

This exhibition has been made possible by an anonymous philanthropic donation. It has received a stipend from the American Friends of the Arts in Ireland (via philanthropist Cormac O'Malley) towards an accompanying lecture.

Susana Solano: Carmen, 2011

Barcelona-based artist Susana Solano has been commissioned by IMMA to install a large stainless steel sculptural work *Carmen* in the 17thcentury cloistered cobbled Courtyard at the heart of IMMA's buildings. Solano's sculptural interventions, encourage us to feel the emotion of those forms transforming our environment. *Carmen* alters our perception of the architectural space that it is contained within, not only through the tunnelling of our vision through the work, but also in the reflection of the museums architecture in the material of stainless steel. Her works tend to invade spaces that are intended as empty silence that architecture engenders, this disruption allows for a nuance of meaning and an openended interpretation of what the artist is trying to achieve.

Born in Barcelona in 1946, Solano is one of a handful of Spanish artists who has gained international recognition. Her work was included in such major exhibitions as the Carnegie International in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, 1988; Documenta 8, Kassel, Germany, 1987; and she was one of two artists representing Spain in the XLIII Venice Biennale in 1988. She is a graduate of Bellas Artes de San Jorge, Barcelona.

Michael Kliën Silent Witness - A Dancing Man A series of Diptychs in time

Silent Witness – A Dancing Man by Michael Kliën is a collaboration between Daghdha Dance Company and IMMA. During Silent Witness choreographer Kliën embeds himself in an established community with neither role nor primary purpose. Soon after, in A Dancing Man he dances, for the first time, in public.

For the first part of a series of diptychs in time, *Silent Witness*, Kliën embeds himself in a specifically chosen social system. During this he will conduct himself in his usual manner by attempting to make friends, having tea, engaging in conversations and sharing problems. To date, three communities, representing nerve-centres of specialised human interactions, are envisaged to host *Silent Witness*.

The second piece, *A Dancing Man*, presents a simple work in dance. Upon Kliën's return from each *Silent Witness* milieu he will dance for one week in a gallery setting - in a reflection of his experiences during the last part of the process. These sessions will last all day, every day, interrupted occasionally for necessary breaks and potential conversations with observers.

Although a professional choreographer since his early 20s, Kliën has never performed in public before.

New Galleries 16 November – 29 January Admission Free Rivane Neuenschwander: A Day Like Any Other

This major mid-career survey of the work of the internationally admired Brazilian artist Rivane Neuenschwander covers a decade of her work. A Day Like Any Other highlights her unique contribution to the narrative of Brazilian Conceptualism and reveals her wide-ranging, interdisciplinary practice that merges painting, photography, film, sculpture, installation, collaborative actions and participatory events. Three installations in the exhibition involve direct visitor participation. The first, I Wish Your Wish, 2003, is based on a tradition at a church in Salvador, Bahia, Brazil, where the faithful tie silk ribbons to their wrists and to the gates of the church; and, according to tradition, their wishes are granted when the ribbons wear away and fall off. At IMMA hundreds of similar ribbons will be printed with visitors' wishes from Neuenschwander's past projects exhibited elsewhere, and will hang from the gallery walls. Visitors are invited to remove a ribbon, tie it to their wrist, and replace it with a new wish written on a slip of paper. The continuation of the project generates new ribbons which generates new dreams.

For the second piece, *First Love,* 2005, a police sketch artist sits with visitors and listens as the visitors describe the faces of their first loves; the sketch artist then produces portraits of these "first loves" to adorn the walls of the gallery for the duration of the exhibition. For the third installation, *Walking in Circles,* 2000, small halos of adhesive are applied to the gallery floor to pick up dirt from visitors' shoes. The work creates a physical and temporal map of the exhibition's traffic patterns.



In addition to these participatory actions and major installations, the exhibition will also contain several series of new paintings and the film *The Tenant*, 2010, which follows the journey of a soap bubble as it wanders through a deserted house in a permanent state of suspension. It also includes sculptures made by customers during conversations at bars and restaurants in Brazil.

The exhibition is curated by Richard Flood, Chief Curator at the New Museum, New York and is organised by the New Museum in collaboration with IMMA.



How to get to IMMA

Museum Entrance on Military Road.

By Luas: Red Line to Heuston Station (5 minutes walk via Military Rd).

New Parking Arrangements

Due to an increasing problem with non-Museum visitors leaving vehicles in the IMMA car park for lengthy periods, the Museum has put in place a carefully-structured payment system, which is being operated by Park Rite. This is designed to deter long-term parking while at the same time facilitating IMMA visitors with an initial charge of just €1 for the first three hours. The new arrangement will be monitored carefully in order to identify and deal with any unforeseen problems.

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Closure of Main Building - November 2011 to December 2012

The Museum wishes to advise visitors that, owing to essential and extensive refurbishing works, the main building at IMMA will be closed from 1 November 2011 until 31 December 2012.

The works, which will be carried out by the OPW, will involve a major upgrade of the Museum's lighting, security and fire safety systems. Work will be confined to the main Museum building and will include the installation of a new wiring and lighting system, a greatly enhanced security capability and a more advanced fire detection system. A new hoist for artworks and an additional fire escape will also be put in place.

The works will significantly enhance the experience for visitors, with greatly improved lighting and flooring, and will restore access to the first floor galleries for wheelchair users and other lift-dependent visitors. In addition, these improvements to the buildings safety systems will enable part of the North Range to be used for exhibitions on a regular basis. The project will also reduce energy costs and enable the Museum to operate in a more environmentally efficient manner. The works are due to be completed in approximately one year, and the Museum is scheduled to reopen to visitors in January 2013.

Exhibitions will continue in the New Galleries and the Artists' Residency Programme will also continue on site during the closure. The café, bookshop and grounds will also remain open to visitors. IMMA will also present exhibitions and projects in an off-site location in Dublin, while the highly-successful National Programme will continue in venues around Ireland, North and South.
