HANNAH ARENDT, ART AND THINKING

The role of the aesthetic imagination as a political *act* was a key focus for the political theorist Hannah Arendt. While she rarely wrote about artworks her thinking sought to link the 'public sphere' as a 'space of appearances' to sense and the aesthetic imagination. How might we read Arendt's interest in *judgment* as a form of political thinking that draws on the *work* of art? Arendt identified a 'crisis of culture' as being intimately related to a 'crisis in thinking'; therefore, this reading group will aim to engage with what might be the relationship between Hannah Arendt, Art and Thinking?

Conveners

The 'Hannah Arendt, Art and Thinking' reading group has been developed by Dr. Sinéad Hogan in discussion with Lisa Moran, and all six sessions will be facilitated by Sinéad and Lisa.

Dr. Sinéad Hogan is an art researcher working in the Institute of Art, Design and Technology (IADT). She lectures on the Art and Research Collaboration MA (ARC) and the BA in Art programs. Her writing, teaching and research concentrates on the relationships between art, philosophy and ethics, with a particular focus on the role of aesthetics in an 'other-than-Art' context.

Dr. Lisa Moran is curator of Engagement and Learning programmes in IMMA with a focus on research and IMMA's relationship with the third level sector. Projects include IMMA Summer School: Art and Politics; IMMA|texts; Groundwork: the art museum as a site for research; Art | Memory | Place and the *What is_*? programme.
