01. Origin Story

Established in 2021, Earth Rising is a dynamic annual festival dedicated to sparking climate conversations and actions through the power of art and culture. The festival, presented by the Irish Museum of Modern Art (IMMA), seeks to inspire collective action towards sustainability and environmental stewardship by providing a platform for artists, advocates, and community members.

The festival emphasises the importance of creativity and community in addressing the climate crisis, aiming to foster a transformative and thriving climate movement in Ireland. Through immersive experiences and collaborative efforts, Earth Rising aspires to be a beacon of hope and a catalyst for positive change.

As Ireland's National Cultural Institution for Modern and Contemporary Art, IMMA understands its role as a space for dialogue and understanding, promoting social progress and cultural innovation in response to contemporary challenges. 

Our mission is to present artistic and cultural experiences at Earth Rising, that catalyse climate conversations and actions.


Our Vision





O5. Insights & Soundbytes from the Earth Rising Talks Series

1

Colonialism and Environmental Destruction

Colonialism established extractive systems that led to environmental degradation, a practice that persists today under global capitalism. These systems of exploitation impact both the earth and marginalised communities disproportionately.

The Politics of Breathing and Suffocation

The ability to breathe freely symbolises broader struggles against systemic oppression, environmental racism, and colonial legacies. Breathing, both literal and metaphorical, is a site of resistance and survival.

Decolonising Knowledge and Aesthetics

Earth Rising aims to highlight and support the work of other organisations and individuals, fostering a resilient and interconnected community that can collaborate effectively.

13 programme partnerships were established

Total festival attendance: 15,000+

Earth Rising also aims to create a supportive atmosphere and sense of community where individuals and groups feel safe to share their ideas and projects and in doing so, encourage open dialogue and collaboration.

In 2024...

72% of speakers and presenters were from underrepresented groups (i.e. women, LGBTQ+, racial/ethnic minorities, people with disabilities).

31% of speakers and presenters were from different regions or countries.



Innovative Data Collection







CLIMATE ATTITUDES 2024

During EARTH RISING 2024, we asked our visitors to share their thoughts and opinions on Earth crisis related topics. Here's what they had to say...


How do feel about the Earth Crisis?




What motivates you the most to take action to address the Earth Crisis?




Where do you go for trusted news about the Earth Crisis?




Do you believe climate change is directly affecting Ireland's weather patterns?



Have you personally felt the effects of climate change in your local area?




Have you taken steps to reduce your personal carbon footprint in the last year?



LEARNING: Providing Immersive Learning Opportunities

Earth Rising sought to engage participants in hands-on, interactive learning experiences related to climate action and sustainability.



Across the festival programme, several leading educational and research institutions were represented including, Dublin City University, University College Dublin, Trinity College Dublin, Research Ireland, University of Gothenburg, Amsterdam School for Cultural Analysis, University of Kent, Queens University, University of Westminster, Open University and University of Bristol.

ACTION: Enable direct climate action

We felt it was important that our volunteers were well-informed and capable of contributing to climate action efforts. To this end, a training session was organised before the festival which included free climate literacy training.

In 2024...

164 hours of free climate literacy training was delivered to our festival volunteers.

In addition, **6** of the Scouting Ireland volunteers received their Scouts Sustainability badges in recognition of their valuable contribution to the festival.









In addition, we also wanted to make it easy for festival goers to find opportunities for them to take direct action in their every-day, but in a fun and meaningful way. So, we partnered with impact agency Protect Blue who created an exciting new game called Climate Therapy, designed to help festivalgoers discover practical and personalised actions that feel right for them.

In just five minutes, this simple, playful game asks four questions about your emotions, values, and connection to nature. Based on your answers, you receive tailored advice to help you take effective climate action that resonates with who you are.

Hundreds of festival attendees completed a "Climate Therapy Session" and since Earth Rising the game has been rolled out to students in Technical University Dublin and Dublin City University.

In 2024, Earth Rising partnered with Native Events who supported our efforts to demonstrate best practice by making Earth Rising as sustainable as possible. In addition to renewable energy, plant-based food options, water stations and reusable dishware, the Native Events team introduced Nifty Bins.

Nifty Bins are not just bins, they are an education system. This fun and engaging waste collection station serviced by Native Events Smart Waste Team. Nifty Bin Pods Stations located throughout the festival site included 7 waste streams – soft plastic, hard plastic, mixed metal, paper, and card, compostables, mixed food, and glass.







Native Events provided reduce, reuse, recycle communications for all festival and event stakeholders and specific checklists for stakeholders helped align the festival's goals with the real actions on the ground.

07. Our Carbon Footprint

This report outlines the carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e) emissions from Earth Rising Festival 2024. The total estimated emissions generated by the festival was 4.44 tonnes CO2e and includes staff and programme travel, supplier freight, materials, waste, and staff meals. It is noted that audience travel is not included in the footprint due to an incomplete dataset that does not accurately represent the estimated 15,000 attendees. It is the intention of the festival to understand the impact of audience travel at future Earth Rising festivals and include it as part of the Scope 3 assessment.

At Earth Rising, we recognise that all festivals and events come with a carbon footprint—from production to audience travel. While reducing our environmental impact is always our priority, we also believe in taking meaningful action to support nature restoration.

That's why, we're partnering with Hometree, a not-for-profit nature restoration charity based in the west of Ireland. Together, we are pledging to restore one acre of Wild Atlantic Rainforest—a permanent native woodland that will be protected in perpetuity for the benefit of people, wildlife, and the planet.

Hometree's approach goes beyond traditional tree-planting, focusing on whole-ecosystem rehabilitation that enhances biodiversity, creates resilient habitats, and safeguards

Ireland's remaining native woodlands. The land will remain publicly accessible and be carefully stewarded to thrive for generations to come.



O8. Contribution to SDGs

This report was generated using the <u>Accelerating Action</u> tool to evaluate how the events and experiences delivered as part of Earth Rising 2024 contribute towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The results show that Earth Rising 2024 contributed positively to all 17 SDGs, with particular strengths relating to Sustainable Cities and Communities (SDG 11), Life Below Water (SDG 14) and Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions (SDG 16).
