## 01. Origin Story

Driven by a shared aim to highlight Irish contemporary art practice on the global stage, the Irish Museum of Modern Art (IMMA), Hugh Lane Gallery, and Culture Ireland launched IRELAND INVITES in 2023. This three-year pilot project advocates for the presence and prominence of Irish visual art on the international biennial circuit.

**IRELAND INVITES** seeks to enhance international exposure for Irish visual artists by hosting biennale curators to undertake visits to studios and art institutions across Ireland. During their visits, curators have the opportunity to develop their understanding of contemporary art practices in Ireland, availing of the curatorial expertise of IMMA, Hugh Lane Gallery and Culture Ireland, who facilitate research and create bespoke hosted trips for each visiting curator.

In it's first two years, IRELAND INVITES has achieved great success.







### 07. Kīpuka Ireland: Hawai'i Triennial 2025

Produced in partnership with Hawai'i Contemporary and supported by Culture Ireland, Kīpuka Ireland was a week-long visiting and exchange initiative, prompted by the IRELAND INVITES initiative. With three artists from Ireland and organized as part of Hawai'i Triennial 2025: ALOHA N $\bar{\mathbf{O}}$ , Kīpuka Ireland consisted of individual presentations, a plenary event, intimate meetings by the artists, and visits to the Triennial exhibitions and sites.

From 31 March to 6 April 2025, the three Irish artists introduced their work in different forms and exchanged with the local artists and communities of Hawai'i.

**Kian Benson Bailes** presented a participatory play workshop and reading session; **Vivienne Dick** screened a series of her films and features in a post-screening conversation; and **Belinda Quirke** performed a live sonic and vocal landscape.

Kīpuka Ireland was curated by **Binna Choi**, one of three curators of HT25 (together with **Wassan Al-Khudhairi** and **Noelle M.K.Y. Kahanu**), in collaboration with **Rachael Gilbourne** (IMMA).

This visiting program fosters deep cultural exchange, exploring the sacred histories of colonisation, language and connection to land between these island nations. Through film, performance, and a hands on workshop, Kipuka Ireland explores how art bridges oceans and histories - positioning IMMA as a centre for research, and a global connector.

# 08. IRELAND INVITES Impact in Summary

Since its inception, IRELAND INVITES has achieved a success rate of 100%. Every international biennial curator who has visited through the programme, and finalised their list of included artists, has selected an Irish Visual Artist for their forthcoming biennial.

Of the **74 artists who have been visited, 18 artists have been selected, achieving a selection rate of 24%**, with six curators still to announce their final list of selected artists.

This is an enormous achievement for such a young programme, demonstrating the appetite for Irish Art globally as well as the desperate need for a platform that can connect international curators with new, exciting, and often underappreciated, talent.

IRELAND INVITES has piqued the interest of the public, with the programme, attracting attention through talks and engagements as well as online. IRELAND INVITES has achieved the following digital reach, predominantly gained through LinkedIn:

Digital Content Reach: 53,000+
Social Media Engagement: 1,500+

Finally, IRELAND INVITES has maintained and encouraged an ethos of diversity and inclusivity, with 94% of the artists selected to participate at biennials identifying as female, LGBTQ+, and/ or of diverse racial/ ethnic heritage.

IMMA, Hugh Lane Gallery, and Culture Ireland and their wider respective teams are excited to achieve even more in the coming years through IRELAND INVITES.
